	<p>JB (Chair) welcomed everyone to the meeting; introductions were made and apologies given.</p> <p>Health & Safety information was shared.</p>

4	Notes from the last meeting (2nd July 2019)	
	The notes were agreed and approved.	
5	Devon & Cornwall Police Update	
	<p>The Chair welcomed Inspector Ian Thompson (IT), Devon & Cornwall Police to the meeting to update the Panel on current local Policing issues.</p> <p>IT provided a hand out (included with the notes) which included the following information:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Connectivity Plan 2019 Falmouth Community • Control Strategy • County Lines • Community Speed Watch <p><u>Questions/Answers/Comments</u></p> <p><i>Comment – SD mentioned that Trading Standards had visited the local Post Office in Perranwell recently to raise awareness regarding elderly people becoming victims of ‘conmen’ and ‘rogue traders’ in rural communities. They provided leaflets and asked that people be vigilant, especially if an elderly person draws out a larger sum of money than is usual.</i></p> <p>IT explained that Trading Standards are working with Devon & Cornwall Police with a ‘Week of Action’ coming up to target rogue traders, support victims and prosecute offenders.</p> <p><i>Q – Which areas do you cover?</i></p> <p>A - Falmouth and Helston, including the parishes that sit within the area.</p> <p><i>Q – How many staff do you have working from Falmouth Police Station?</i></p> <p>A - There are currently 28 Response Officers, 6 Sergeants, 4 Neighbourhood Beat Managers, 8 PCSO, 6 Police Constables, 1 Detective Constable and 1 Detective Inspector.</p> <p>Due to shift patterns there are 5/6 Response Officers working at one time answering 999 calls. There is a two hour shift overlap during the week and a five hour shift overlap at the weekend.</p> <p><i>Q – DW (St Gluvias) – Can I suggest that Parish Councils are</i></p>	

	<p><i>included as Stakeholders to help the Police with their priorities?</i> A – IT agreed this was a positive move, and will take this back.</p> <p><i>Q – There is a 40mph speed limit on the bypass, but people are driving at speeds of 60mph. Are you policing this?</i> A – We received a complaint two weeks ago and the Police Road Team has made 2 stops. There are 40mph repeater signs in place, but these are not enforceable at present as there isn't a large repeater sign in situ. JB to raise with CC and report back to IT.</p> <p><i>Q – Is Operation Kracken active in the area?</i> A - Yes it is. Operation Kracken is a joint law enforcement operation tackling maritime border crime, including illegal immigration, illegal contraband and terrorism. The Police will go to 'soft targets' where it is thought people may come in. The Neighbourhood Teams are linked in with Special Branch and Border Force. There was a recent incident in the West of Cornwall where a boat transferred a number of illegal immigrants to a lorry that was waiting and this will feature as part of the 'Call the Cops' programme in the coming weeks.</p> <p><i>Q –People put cones in the road outside their property when they go out, to stop others from parking there. I understand resources are limited but this causes real issues in the village.</i> A – There is legislation that prohibits people putting things on the public carriageway and effectively they are breaking the law. Unfortunately this wouldn't sit within the Control Strategy as there is no or low risk and as a force we have to focus on more serious crime. I don't wish to belittle the problem and we would like to be able to deal with these, but it is a slow process.</p> <p>The Chair thanked IT for updating the Panel and taking questions.</p>	<p>IT</p> <p>JB</p>
6	Transformation of Adult Social Care & Health	
	<p>The Chair welcomed Jonathan Price (JP), Service Director Adult Transformation and Commissioning to the meeting.</p> <p>JP provided a presentation to the Panel on the Transformation of Adult Social Care and Health, and the benefits and impact on the local community (included with the notes).</p> <p><u>Questions/Answers/Comments</u> <i>Q – A few years ago there was a shortage of Social Workers in Cornwall. Is this still the case today?</i> A – The majority of staff are permanent, but in terms of recruitment we have a number of temporary staff in post. We have just launched a new strategy to 'grow' people who have come in, to take on Case Co-ordination work. This is a new approach we are trying.</p> <p><i>Q – Is there a provision for End of Life Care?</i> A – We are currently looking at services within the CCG provision and it is recognised there is a gap. Unfortunately not all of the varied types of services are available in Cornwall.</p>	

	<p><i>Q – What is the current situation with short breaks for people with a learning disability? There is current demand.</i></p> <p>A – There is an internal service, and one that we buy in. We are looking to reconfigure our internal service so that we are able to offer it to a lot more people. There is a demand for both services.</p> <p><i>Q – With an ageing population one would assume a higher level of dementia diagnosis?</i></p> <p>A – Unfortunately not all go for assessment, so we rely on partner agencies and GPs to refer people they see and are concerned about.</p> <p><i>Q – How can Town and Parish Councils support you?</i></p> <p>A – Today is the start of conversations and opening up the communication link with Town and Parish Councils. You know the people living within your communities and can communicate with them. We are keen to explore double devolution of budgets and to look at how services, particularly day provision could be provided differently.</p> <p>MJ explained that in the Camborne, Pool, Illogan and Redruth Community Network area, one of the panel priorities is mapping services.</p> <p>Age UK has an excellent interactive map that covers Cornwall that people can access to find local services. Please see the link below. https://cornwall-link.co.uk/</p> <p>JP explained the service is very open to training people, particularly in Safeguarding and would be happy to discuss potential training for Network Panels.</p> <p>The Chair thanked JP for providing a presentation to the Panel and taking questions.</p>	
7	Localism Annual Meeting	
	<p>MJ talked about the annual Localism Summit Meeting held in November. This year it will take place on 6th November, 9.30am – 3.30pm at Wadebridge Showground. This is an opportunity to meet with Town and Parish Councils and will be an interactive session.</p> <p>There will be two topics for discussion:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The Future of Localism – This will look at how the local authority works together with Town and Parish Councils, to enhance the future delivery of services to our communities. 2. Climate Change – Given the number of climate emergency declaration this session will focus on how the local authority and Town and Parish Councils can work together to tackle climate change and support community action. 	
8	Cornwall Councillor Updates

	<p>The highways work on the passing place in Mylor is due to commence in the next two weeks.</p> <p><u>Cllr Peter Williams – Mabe, St Gluvias & Perranarworthal</u> The highways works in Ponsanooth are scheduled for October and should be finished before Christmas. The work includes a crossing and refurbishment of monitors.</p> <p>Perranarworthal has bought two new speed monitors and has been granted special permission to site them on the A39. This will allow evidence to build up and prove the need for speed restrictions.</p> <p><u>Cllr John Bastin - Constantine, Mawnan & Budock</u> Work is starting on Bickland Water Road for 15 weeks to include a cycle way, island and pedestrian crossing.</p> <p><u>Cllr Jayne Kirkham – Falmouth Smithick</u> Attends the Falmouth Homeless Action Group (HAG) meeting on a monthly basis. JK reiterated the importance of reporting via Street Link, Cornwall Councillors and Police, all of whom are in contact with St Petrocs and Cornwall Housing.</p> <p>There is now a CCTV camera in Town Quarry Car Park.</p>	
9	Town and Parish Council Updates	
	<p><u>St Gluvias PC</u> CORMAC have been working in the parish on the dropped kerb and have done a really good job. The parish would like to express their thanks to CORMAC.</p> <p><u>Mawnan PC</u> The draft Neighbourhood Plan is progressing well and early indication is that Mawnan won't be required to provide a Strategic Environmental Assessment. Looking at Referendum in the New Year. There is an 'Open Day' being held on 27 & 28 September in the Methodist Hall, Mawnan for people to view and discuss the draft plan.</p> <p>The Parish Council has decided not to declare a Climate Emergency. Instead they would rather choose to consider it and project the community as climate conscious and work with the local community to look at ways to tackle the issues.</p> <p>The Parish Council is applying for planning permission to build a new office for the Parish Clerk which would allow space for the Parish Council too.</p> <p>MJ congratulated Mawnan PC on their Neighbourhood Plan. It is very comprehensive and was completed in an impressive timeframe.</p> <p><u>Falmouth Town Council</u> The Neighbourhood Plan is currently with the Inspector. This has been one of the most complex of plans and there was a lot of input</p>	

	<p>from other partners and services required.</p> <p>AJ is attending a meeting to discuss the Maples Beach Café, beach and concerns regarding the state of the car park.</p> <p>BR asked that the Falmouth Harbour Commissioners are invited to attend future Panel meetings. The area from Falmouth Bay to St Austell Bay is a Special Site of Scientific Interest (SSSI) and a Marine Protected Area.</p> <p><u>Budock PC</u> There is currently a speeding issue throughout the parish. An Expression of Interest (EOI) has been submitted for a speed camera on Treverbyn Road.</p> <p>The Neighbourhood Plan is progressing well and there will be a public event in October. It is hoped there will be an early finish in 2020.</p>	ER/ND
